Subject: Wolves in the Sequoia National Forest – Significant New Information and the need for ESA Consultation re Various Projects in the Greenhorn Mountains

We were thrilled to learn that a female gray wolf and her four offspring (two males and two females) have made it to the Sequoia National Forest/Giant Sequoia National Monument. We hope they will make it their permanent home. On behalf of Sequoia ForestKeeper (SFK), the Kern-Kaweah Chapter of the Sierra Club (SC), the Sequoia Taskforce of the Sierra Club (STF), the John Muir Project of Earth Island Institute (JMP), and the Tule River Conservancy (TRC), I am submitting comments and providing notice that the Forest Service has a legal obligation under NEPA to take a hard look at the effects of various project activities, based on this significant new information regarding the presence of wolves in the Sequoia National Forest and Giant Sequoia National Monument. And because the gray wolf is listed as endangered under the Endangered Species Act in California, the Forest Service has a legal obligation to consult with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service regarding all management that may affect these wolves.

While the exact location of the five wolves has not been disclosed, as best as we can deduce they were first sighted in the Western Divide Ranger District on July 6, 2023 by Colibri Ecological Consulting where that organization has been working. And since wolves roam widely, have large territories, and can cover substantial distances in one day, it is likely that they are not only using the entire Western Divide Ranger District but may also be roaming south along the Greenhorn Mountains crest into the Kern River Ranger District.

Immediately, this new information implicates ongoing actions the Forest Service is currently implementing, including the **Region 5 Post-Disturbance Hazardous Tree Management Project** and the **Emergency Response, R5 Giant Sequoia Groves Fuels Reduction and Restoration Projects.** The Forest Service should place a pause on those actions and, in

consultation with U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, determine whether any activities associated with those and other projects could adversely affect the wolves.

Moreover, in the near future several other project activities could also cause direct, indirect, and cumulative effects, such as those proposed in the **Castle Fire Ecological Restoration Project** and the **Windy Fire Ecological Restoration Project**. For both projects, NEPA has been completed but the Biological Assessments (BAs) and Environmental Assessment (EAs) have not considered or assessed the effects from management activities on gray wolves. While, of course this is not the fault of the Forest Service, NEPA now requires the Forest Service to take a step back and make sure these analyses are conducted and that ESA consultation is completed before it issues final decisions for these projects. Cumulatively, other actions may also need to consider the effects on these wolves, such as the **French Fire Restoration Project** to the south in the Greenhorn Mountains in the Kern River Ranger District.

Project and Cumulative Effects on Wolves

The significant new information of the presence of wolves requires supplemental analyses. In doing so, NEPA requires the Forest Service to consider the potential direct, indirect, and cumulative effects on wolves. Moreover, the ESA requires that the Forest Service find ways to mitigate project and other effects to avoid potential take, including harassment.

Direct effects from project activities that occur in gray wolf habitat could affect individuals by causing disturbance to wolves resulting in temporary habitat avoidance. In other national forests, like the Lassen, the California Department of Fish and Wildlife implements the 1-mile buffer from an active den or known rendezvous site. Should activities occur within 1 mile of a known den or a wolf rendezvous site, a limited operating period is put into effect to avoid disturbances. This LOP and associated avoidances can mitigate adverse effects when wolves are particularly sensitive to human activity and reduce the possibility of den abandonment. Gray wolves are highly mobile and have a broad range of habitat tolerance. And although wolves are habitat generalists and are not dependent on tree structure, they require large areas of undisturbed habitat to retreat to with opportunities to find prey.

Indirect effects from activities associated with the ongoing and proposed action could also cause disturbances that may lead to behavioral alterations to prey species, such as fleeing, or displacement. Cumulative effects include impacts from private and state activities that occur near project areas. One such activity is the proposed salvage logging project on the Tule Indian Reservation in the Windy Fire area. *See* Attachment A – Windy South Fire Salvage Timber Sale Advertisement in Porterville Recorder. Other causes of direct wolf mortality include starvation, disease, intraspecific aggression, interspecific conflicts, accidents, and human-related events such as illegal poaching and vehicle collisions (Paquet and Carbyn 2003). These must all be considered and analyzed in the cumulative effects analyses.

By taking a measured and deliberate approach and considering all of the potential effects based on this new information and these new circumstances, we can hopefully retain these wolves in the Sequoia National Forest and Giant Sequoia National Monument, which should be the underlying goal of the analysis and consultation.


